CDC Update on the COVID-19 Pandemic and Delta Variant

Yesterday CDC announced an [update on the status of the COVID-19 pandemic](#). COVID-19 cases are increasing across the country driven largely by a surging Delta variant. Because of this new science, CDC recommends that people wear a mask in public indoor settings in areas of high transmission, even for those who are fully vaccinated. The guidance for [healthcare settings](#) includes the same precautions to help keep patients safe.

While this pandemic continues to be a top health concern, [getting people back to screening](#) and staying healthy is an important task before us. Prolonged delays in cancer screening may lead to an increase in existing health disparities, especially among adults already experiencing health inequities. A recent study looking at data for women screened by CDC's National Breast and Cervical Cancer Early Detection Program shows [declines](#) in breast cancer screening varied from 84% percent among Hispanic women to 98% among American Indian/Alaskan Native women at the beginning of the pandemic in 2020

TOP 5 THINGS TO KNOW ABOUT COVID-19 AND DELTA VARIANT

1 Getting vaccinated prevents severe illness, hospitalization, and death; it also helps reduce the spread of the virus in communities.

- Unvaccinated individuals should get vaccinated and continue masking until they are fully vaccinated. With the Delta variant, this is more urgent than ever. The highest spread of cases and severe outcomes is happening in places with low vaccination rates.

2 Data show Delta is different than past versions of the virus: it is much more contagious.

- Some vaccinated people can get Delta in a breakthrough infection and may be contagious.

- Even so, vaccinated individuals represent a very small amount of transmission occurring around the country. Virtually all hospitalizations and deaths continue to be among the unvaccinated.

3 In areas with substantial and high transmission, CDC recommends that everyone (including fully vaccinated individuals) wear a mask in public indoor settings to help prevent spread of Delta and protect others.

4 CDC recommends that community leaders encourage vaccination and masking to prevent further outbreaks in areas of substantial and high transmission.

5 CDC recommends universal indoor masking for all teachers, staff, students, and visitors to K-12 schools, regardless of vaccination status. Children should return to full-time in-person learning in the fall with layered prevention strategies in place.

BIGGER AND BETTER BAY GAMES ATTRACTING MORE TOURISTS TO THE REGION

Thousands of athletes from across Australia will bring their best and test their skills at The Bay Games in beautiful Jervis Bay this November, thanks to the NSW Government's Regional Events Acceleration Fund.

Deputy Premier and Minister for Regional NSW John Barilaro said The Bay Games has received NSW Government support to help attract even more elite and everyday athletes to the bayside town of Huskisson from 7 - 14 November 2021.

"The Bay Games is one of Australia's largest fitness festivals and the new, bigger format is expected to attract more than 5,000 competitors and spectators, who will stay longer and spend more tourism dollars in the Shoalhaven," Mr Barilaro said.

"The funding will enable the festival to expand to seven days and will include a five-day emersion event *Harnessing Human Potential* focusing on mental health and physical fitness, and featuring TV personalities, Olympians and World Champions.

"Hosting major events like the week-long Bay Games puts more heads on beds and fills local restaurants, cafes and tourist attractions, all of which helps drive regional NSW's economic recovery from floods, bushfire, drought and COVID-19."

Member for South Coast, Shelley Hancock MP said the NSW Government's support is a huge boost for these events that bring communities together to highlight the benefits of an active lifestyle and better mental health.

"This event is also about supporting athletes of all abilities and seeing the top competitors will elevate everyday athletes and encourage everyone to embrace a more active lifestyle," Mrs Hancock said.

The \$20 million Regional Events Acceleration Fund is part of the \$2 billion Regional Growth Fund, designed to support growing regional centres, activate local economies and improve services and community infrastructure for regional communities.

Diabetes risk on the rise

NEW data shows the risk of developing Type 2 diabetes has increased since the start of the pandemic.

Data using Australia's leading Type 2 Diabetes Risk Indicator suggests the risk of developing the disease has increased across all age groupings between 16 and 75 since the onset of the pandemic, and for cohorts in every state except South Australia.

The data, which shows a clear lift in AUSDRISK scores over the course of the pandemic, was collected from more than 300 health stations positioned in pharmacies around the nation.

Collected up to 9 June 2021, the data shows an average of 26.5% of those surveyed were at high risk of developing Type 2 diabetes in 2021, compared with 24.5% in 2019. A "High" AUSDRISK rating means an individual has a 1 in 14 chance of developing Type 2 Diabetes in the next five years.

SiSU Health managing director Noel Duncan said restrictions and lockdowns were having clear consequences on the health and wellbeing of Australians.

"The health data portrays a concerning trend in recent months that carries ramifications for thousands of Australians. but it is also important to recognise the proactive steps within our control," he said.

"We are trying to highlight that in more than half of cases, Type 2 Diabetes is a preventable disease. By monitoring your health and heeding early warnings, you can actually take measures to improve your health," Dr Duncan said.

While genetic disposition plays a strong role in development of type 2 diabetes, the risk is greatly increased through insufficient physical activity, poor diet, and obesity. Smoking and high cholesterol are also risk factors.

Dr Duncan said having access to immediate health feedback was a powerful tool not just for individuals, but also for the community in general.

"By painting a picture of population health and trends, real-time health data enables governments and organisations to invest in information campaigns and research that will make a real difference to community health outcomes," Dr Duncan said.

SiSU health checks assess a range of health indicators including blood pressure, stress levels, weight and diabetes risk. Data on smoking, diet and physical activity are also collected.

Six of the seven age groupings above 16 years of age showed a moderate increase in risk. Only the oldest group (over 75-year-olds) remained static. Similarly, nearly every state and territory showed an increase in the proportion at high risk.

Only South Australia experienced a decline. South Australia was also the only jurisdiction across Australia to record a decline in High BMI prevalence during the COVID period.

Advanced Recycling Technology for the Shoalhaven

The Shoalhaven is running out of land filling space. Within 10 years our West Nowra landfill facility will reach capacity.

As a result, Shoalhaven City Council has undergone an extensive process of consulting with industry experts to find an economically and environmentally sound solution to a waste problem that faces local governments across Australia.

Household mixed-waste (red lid bins) in the Shoalhaven will soon be processed at a new facility in West Nowra – The West Nowra Resource Recovery Facility (RRF). Everything that can be reused or recycled is extracted in one process.

This state of the art facility will be Australia's first Advanced Waste Treatment plant capable of diverting over 90% of Mixed Waste from landfill.

The new Resource Recovery Facility (RRF) will be constructed on Council owned land adjacent to the current West Nowra Landfill site. Works will commence in 2022 and the facility is expected to be fully operational by late 2023.

Schedule of Meetings Amended following the postponement of the Local Government Elections

FOUNDATIONS LAID FOR NEW NOWRA BRIDGE

The foundations are in and the bridge deck is launching on the Nowra Bridge replacement project.

Senator for NSW Jim Molan said the \$342 million project to deliver a new four-lane bridge over the Shoalhaven River, upgraded intersections and additional lanes on the Princes Highway would improve traffic flow and ease congestion through the Nowra-Bomaderry area.

“We are powering ahead on this project, with all 39 pile casings now in place for the new bridge, providing the foundation for the next stage of work,” Senator Molan said.

“These piles were built by vibrating and hammering steel casings through the river bed and into the rock layer deep below the river.

“Excavating and removing river sediment inside the top segment of the pile casings and replacing this with reinforced concrete is continuing.

“This project is proving a game changer for locals, supporting 200 jobs during its construction and delivering valuable skills training and work experience with high levels of Aboriginal, female and youth participation.”

State Member for South Coast Shelley Hancock said four pile caps, four piers, and two of 19 bridge deck segments were now in place over the Shoalhaven River as part of the replacement project.

“The new bridge is being built using a specialised technique known as incremental launching, and the double-T bridge deck segments are being built on site then launched out over the river,” Mrs Hancock said.

“Each double-T bridge deck segment requires 360 cubic metres of reinforced concrete and up to 60 concrete trucks.

“These segments are then incrementally launched across the Shoalhaven River using hydraulic jacks.

“As work powers ahead on this project, we’re seeking feedback via an online questionnaire about the community’s experience with the project team during construction. It can be completed anonymously until Friday, 13 August.”

Other work in coming months will include building the northern end of the new bridge, piling for Bomaderry Creek Bridge, asphaltting a new local road named Shearwater Way and installing street lighting, kerb and gutter across the project.

Motorists will soon be driving on a new section of Illaroo Road to allow widening work nearby to continue and the community will be notified of traffic changes in the coming weeks.

The Nowra Bridge is a \$342 million project (including planning costs). The Australian and NSW governments have each committed \$155 million to jointly fund construction of the new bridge.

Criminal Justice Aboriginal over-representation quarterly report: March 2021

Today BOCSAR launches a new statistical report designed to monitor progress towards reducing the over-representation of Aboriginal people in custody in NSW.

The report shows:

- Performance against two key indicators of Aboriginal over-representation in the justice system:
 - The number of Aboriginal people in custody
 - The number of court appearances involving Aboriginal people
 - Results for 14 secondary measures which contribute to changes in custody and court volumes. These secondary measures include police actions, bail decisions, bail breaches, court outcomes and reoffending

Separate reports are available for Aboriginal young people and Aboriginal adults.
