John Jervis was born in Meaford, Staffordshire on 9 January 1735 the second son of Swynfen and Elizabeth Jervis. [6][7][8] His father was a barrister, counsellor to the Admiralty Board and auditor of Greenwich Hospital. [9] Swynfen Jervis intended that his son should follow him to the bar. 
In 1969 the Geographical Names Board called the area east of the Wool Road and north to Cock Crow Creek (now called Cockrow Creek) Sanctuary Point, after suggestions of calling it after the original development... Royal Park.

Prior to the original development of this area, which did not show much progress before 1951. much of the area was State Forests, for which we can now see the remnants of those very large forest trees, amongst our residential properties. Although many of the large trees have been removed as residential, public

and commercial occupancy moved into the area and roads and pathways were cut through the forests, many of the trees were left, peppered along the winding footpaths and private properties throughout Sanctuary Point.



It is no wonder, that a further 50 years on, these forest trees have grown taller and older and with age, like the brittle bones of our own ageing, the decaying branches of the trees tend to break more frequent and deposit a devastating thud to the ground.

Just when you think you have had enough of trees, here is another example of what happens when a root ball of a large tree is compromised and can no longer support the weight of the tree... It tends to fall over! Like this tree between 58 and 62 MacGibbon Parade, Old Erowal Bay, which is being supported by a few small branches of another tree in its path.

It would appear that this tree is ready to fall down, into the reserve between these two proper-



ties and although it looks as if the tree will fall without taking any further tree / trees with it, you can not guarantee how a tree will react when it falls... If it decides to twist, there could be further damage to other trees. This reserve is used by the young and old as they move in and out of the reserve, when they go for walks, or ride their bikes. In one of the properties, there are 8 children, from ages 5 to 17 living and no doubt use the reserve from time to time!









On this same reserve, there is an open drain, within a few meters of 58 Mac Gibbon Parade, which is further deteriorating the root ball of another very large tree, as it despatches cascading quantities of a large percentage of Old Erowal Bay's gutter system, into the creek at the back of the reserve.

I would like to see this open drain fully closed off with proper pipes, to a safe location from the residential home of 58 Mac Gibbon Parade, or failing that! At least have a grid placed over the discharge end of the drainage pipe, to stop children from over the area, ad-
