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An Orchid is an Orchid, but do you really know what an Orchid is?

There's more to the orchid that meets the eye. With a delicate, sculptural beauty and historical rarity, these exotic blooms carry an unrivalled symbol of refinement, luxury and mystery. Check out these five interesting facts about one of the most popular flowers in the world!

#1 There are more than 25,000 different types of

orchids existing naturally. Believe it or not, orchids make up the planet's largest group of blooming flowers. They grow in every continent but one (sadly, you won't find them in icy Antarctica), and come in hundreds of shapes and sizes. Also, about 99% of orchids today are within reach and available for cultivation, while 1% of tropical varieties still grow in virtually inaccessible habitats and have only been seen a handful of times.

#2 Orchids come in every colour of the rainbow, with the exception of one.

Whatever the occasion or mood, it's likely there's a colour of orchid to express it. Orchids bloom in every colour—from deep fuchsia to white to green—except for one: black! And although they're rare, there are even true blue orchids, and ones that bloom in dual colour combos like lavender and pink or green and yellow. That's just one of many reasons why orchids can be so versatile, acting as stand-alone centrepieces or as exotic additions to other arrangements.

#3 They're still hunted and traded by avid international collectors.

Despite their rarity, orchids are still sought out by international collectors, enthusiasts and hunters for their long-lasting and record-holding blooms.

#4 Once an expensive and highly demanded commodity, orchids were believed to have healing, disease-fighting and protective properties. In traditional Chinese medicine, the orchid was used to help cure coughs and lung illnesses. In ancient Greece, orchids were associated with virility and male fertility, the belief being that if women ate orchid flowers, they would bear a son to continue the family tradition. The Aztecs were known to drink a mixture of vanilla orchid flowers and chocolate to give them strength. And believe it or not—the Victorians were so mystified by the orchid's irresistible beauty that they collected and displayed them like treasures.

#5 The orchid flower gives us... VANILLA! (Yup, you heard right.)

You know the vanilla extract you pour into all those cake and cookie recipes? It comes from the orchid! Vanilla is a species of orchid, and vanilla extract comes from the orchid Vanilla planifolia. It's the only orchid that produces a fruit that can be eaten, which also means—you guessed it—vanilla is a fruit!

BUDGET DELIVERS ESSENTIAL INFRASTRUCTURE AND SERVICES FOR SOUTH COAST

Member for South Coast Shelley Hancock today welcomed a Budget which delivers new schools, upgraded roads, redeveloped health facilities and better roads for the South Coast.

"This Budget delivers on the commitments the NSW Government made prior to the March election, with funding secured for a new school at Worrigee/South Nowra, the relocation of Budawang School, a new police station for Culburra Beach and millions to upgrade the Princes Highway," Mrs Hancock said.

Fortune? Let's not tempt fate





IT WAS unusual for my father-in-law to call me at work; the urgency in his voice was disturbing.

"Would you be able to take me to the bank ... today," he gasped, "I've inherited some money - \$12,000 - and I need to get to the bank."

Now we don't come from a particularly flush family when it comes to money in the bank, so I was suspicious. Why did he need to get to the bank if someone was giving him money?

"I just need to get some money to take to the money exchange people to send to the man to cover the paperwork and I'll get the money in a few days."

Oh dear. Pop's joy turned to disbelief and then embarrassment. He had almost been scammed.

Sadly, scammers are slick characters, sometimes going to elaborate lengths to look authentic. Their only goal? To fleece the

unwary of as much money as possible.

We all know that if something sounds too good to be true, it probably is. But when put on the spot, with news that brightens a dull day, even the most scam-savvy of us could be forgiven for pausing, if only for a few seconds, to ponder the possibility of instant, unplanned wealth.

An email from a reader reinforced this. He'd been on Messenger when a friend "waved" at him. "Wave back" came the message. And so messages went back and forth ... but in language that did not quite sound like his friend, who apparently had received \$90,000 thanks to a random Facebook giveaway and had seen the reader's name and picture on the winners' list. He needed to contact the agent, quickly, to make sure he was still on the list. The reader admits

that after waiting far too long, he called his friend who, of course, knew nothing of the messages.

This story had a happy ending: thousands do not. Scammers gleaned more than \$21.4 million from Australians aged over 65 last year. Investment scams were worst (\$7.6 million), while dating and romance scams also took a huge toll (\$5.8 million).

Whether it's a phone call, a text, email or Facebook message, or someone at the door offering to asphalt your driveway, be vigilant. And don't be afraid to ask someone for help or advice. You might feel stupid, but a red face is better than an empty bank book.

This weekend a combined **Nowra –St Georges Basin SES team won the Cliff Harris Memorial**

Trophy. Shoalhaven recorded the most points by an SES unit in the overnight event held in rugged bush terrain 180km west of Sydney.



The team were led by NavShield veteran Dave Jones from NSW SES Nowra Unit.

"The course was challenging especially in the freezing conditions, but our resilience and teamwork gave us the competitive edge. It's incredibly rewarding to achieve this recognition amongst our emergency service peers.

"We're proud to receive this award named after a

much-missed member of our Nowra Unit, Cliff Harris," says Team Captain Dave Jones.





Now in its 31st year, NavShield was organised by NSW SES Bush Search & Rescue Unit (BSAR). Teams compete in one day or overnight exercises and are equipped with maps and compasses. The winning team reaches the most check points across the 80 square kilometre course in the shortest time.

The 2019 course was set in Kanangra-Boyd National Park.

Local Youth Invited to Taskforce

Member for South Coast Shelley Hancock MP today encouraged young people in the Illawarra Shoalhaven Region to get in their applications to join NSW's first ever Regional Youth Taskforce which will give youth a chance to have their say on local issues.

Mrs Hancock said the taskforce will be made up of 18 members who will meet regularly and provide direct advice and feedback to NSW Government agencies and Ministers on policy decisions and local action plans regarding youth.

"To the young people living in the South Coast, this is your chance to be heard, to voice your opinion on local issues, to represent your mates and peers and to help make decisions that will drive change in your own community," Mrs Hancock said.

"Homelessness and mental health are just some of the challenges in our area and will be working to address these with the help of the Taskforce."

"We know each region has different challenges, that's why we are seeking an even representation of two members from each of the nine NSW regions - if you are aged 12 to 24 and have an idea for youth in our community, this is a great time to share it."

Minister for Regional Youth Bronnie Taylor said work is underway to address issues facing young people in regional NSW through multiple initiatives including the \$50 million announced for regional youth through the Stronger Country Communities Fund.

"I am pleased to say the NSW Government has established the first ever Office for Regional Youth and we will soon release the State's first Regional Youth Strategy to address challenges in regional NSW," Mrs Taylor said.

"The young people of today will become the leaders of tomorrow which is why the NSW Government wants to ensure our regional youth are front and centre throughout the decision-making process."

Travel costs and accommodation will be covered for Regional Youth Taskforce members travelling across NSW for meetings.

From On The Beat - NSW Police Shoalhaven Crime Prevention



with Senior Constable Anthony Jory Opportunistic Offences

Many thefts from your yard and home are opportunistic offences.

Take a minute to have a look around your front yard and consider the amount of removable property that is laying around your yard, verandah, carports and in the back of utes or boats.

Yes, some items are unavoidable and need to be left at some risk due to their daily use and purpose. However, I can guarantee there are many items that could be moved and secured out of sight.

In the past where these offences have been committed regularly in certain areas, general duties officers during proactive patrols in the early hours of the morning in several residential areas have seen garage doors open with lights on displaying a variety of valuable property, lawn mowers and bicycles left on the front lawn.

They have seen a variety of valuable items left in boats and tray backs.

On occasions officers have left a promotional pamphlet at the premises highlighting the time police were in the area making the observation and some property security hints.

This achieves several things for police - firstly it is hoped this would prompt the property owner to take some action towards some home security options as well as prevent a future offence from occurring.

Secondly, it also shows police are out and about responding to crime trends identified and we are trying to prevent further offences.

We just need property owners to assist by taking away that opportunity where they can in the first place.
